








- Start a business... sell stuff on line, mow lawns or even consult

- Assisting on proposal teams pays, and doesn't pay.
- Consider being an adjunct professor.

- Other Consortiums









Free. There is no cost to be a coalition member


Independent. Joining the coalition does not create any legal ties or obligations


