#### 163 ATKW History



- 1946: The 163 ATKW began as the 196th Fighter Squadron on 9 November 1946 at Norton AFB, San Bernardino, CA.
- 1948: The 196th was one of the first ANG units to receive 25 new F-80C "Shooting Star" aircraft.
- **1950**: Called to active duty on 10 October 1950 to assist United Nation Forces during the Korean War. While stationed in Northern Japan, the unit flew F-84E "Thunderjets" with regular active-duty Air Force units.
- **1954**: The 196th returned to the United States and resumed operations at Ontario International Airport in Ontario, CA. The unit received and flew the P-51H "Mustang" as its primary aircraft until March 1954.
- 1958: On 17 May 1958, the Air Force reorganized and expanded the 196th Fighter Interceptor Squadron into the 163rd Fighter Interceptor Group as part of the North American Defense Command.
- 1975: On 8 March 1975, the unit took on a new mission and was reassigned under the Tactical Air Command as the 163rd Tactical Air Support Group. The 163rd received the 0-2A/B "Super Skymaster" to accomplish the unit's new role.
- **1982**: In October 1982, the 163rd officially assumed a tactical fighter role flying the F-4C "Phantom." The group also moved to <a href="March AFB">March AFB</a> into new facilities specifically built for the unit.

## 163 ATKW History (continued)



- **1987**: The 163rd transitioned to the F-4E on 1 April 1987. This newer aircraft incorporated more sophisticated electronics and weaponry.
- **1990**: In July 1990, the unit once again changed missions and was redesignated the 163rd Tactical Reconnaissance Group. The 163rd was equipped with RF-4C aircraft and maintained a dual state/federal mission.
- 1993: Redesignated the 163rd Air Refueling Wing on 1 October 1993 as part of the Air Mobility Command commitment to Global Reach and flew KC-135 tankers
- **2006**: In November 2006, the Wing was redesignated to the 163rd Reconnaissance Wing. The Wing was the first ANG unit to receive the MQ-1 Predator and the first to become a fully functional ANG Formal Training Unit (FTU) and Field Training Detachment (FTD) for the Predator.
- 2015: On 1 July 2015, the 163rd Reconnaissance Wing was redesignated as the 163rd Attack Wing and transitioned to the MQ-9 emote piloted aircraft.






## Existing Conditions – Land Use







## ANG CE Proj Funding



- Local Sustainment Restoration Modernization (SRM) (~\$500K) / year
  - Work orders requiring contract
