


Disaster/Event Cycle





Recovery Continuum





Each disaster begins and ends at the local level.

- Local governments (counties, cities, or towns) respond to emergencies daily using their own resources.
- Local governments rely on mutual aid and assistance agreements with neighboring jurisdictions.
- When an incident response exceeds local resource capabilities the state can be requested to assist.



According to state law, a **DISASTER** is the occurrence or imminent threat of widespread or severe damage, injury, or loss of life or property resulting from:

- Fire
- Flood
- Earthquake
- Wind
- Storm
- Wave action
- Oil spill or other water contamination
- Volcanic activity
- Epidemic
- Air contamination

- Blight
- Drought
- Infestation
- Explosion
- Riot
- Hostile military or paramilitary action
- Extreme heat
- Energy emergency

Eye of the Storm Report

- Post Hurricane Harvey, Governor Abbott formed the Commission to Rebuild Texas headed by Texas A&M University System Chancellor John Sharp.
- The Texas A&M University System Chancellor following his appointment by Governor Greg Abbott led to the creation of *The Eye of The Storm* report.
- The report contained 44 recommendations.
- Including transferring TDEM from the Texas
 Department of Public Safety and into the Texas A&M
 University System.






State Response to Disasters



TDEM Regions


- Texas is divided into 8 geographical regions.
- Transitioned from 6
 geographical regions to better
 serve the State of Texas.
- Each region has a designated TDEM Assistant Chief.






State Disaster Districts

- Texas has 24 Disaster
 Districts Texas Capitol is recognized at the 25th
 Disaster District.
- Boundaries based on Councils of Government.
- Each Disaster District has a TDEM District Chief.





County Liaison Officers



- Hired initial 100 field response employees.
- Providing more comprehensive state support for additional Texas communities.
- Improving emergency management capabilities statewide.
- Will more than triple the size of TDEM's field support network.



Emergency Management Council

Purpose

- Provide advice on and assistance with response operations.
- Convene at the SOC (DDC for District/Regional Members) to carry out state response activities for major emergencies and disasters.
- Mandated by executive order to advise and assist the governor in all matters relating to disaster.

Team Members

- Agencies that have legal responsibility, expertise or resources needed for a specific emergency response function.
- Members MUST HAVE decision making authority and knowledge of agency's capabilities.

Disaster District Committee (DDC)

- May be partially or fully activated during emergencies.
- Identifies, mobilizes, and coordinates the use of state resources within the District to respond to emergencies.
- If state resources within the District are insufficient or inappropriate to meet a need, the request for assistance is forwarded to the State Operations Center (SOC) for action.
- The DDC Chair provides guidance and control for deployed state response resources.



Texas State Operations Center (SOC)

The SOC uses an extensive suite of communications to receive and disseminate alerts of threats state-wide.

- Monitors 3,000 to 4,000 incidents per year.
- The Emergency Management Council (EMC) convenes at the SOC to organize state response activities.
- The SOC is a coordination and communications hub to respond to a natural or man-made emergency or disaster.






