






MOUNT TACOMA POST

Origins of the SAME Mount Tacoma Post

SAME Mt. Tacoma (Tahoma) was founded November 6, 1950, Tahoma is the native/indigenous name for Mt. Rainier

The Tacoma Post has a rich history dating back over 70 years, with its members making valuable contributions to military engineering projects and innovations in the Pacific Northwest and beyond. From constructing essential infrastructure at military installations across Washington state to advising policymakers on engineering and national security matters, the Tacoma Post has played a key role in SAME's mission of connecting military and civilian engineers to advance engineering support for national security.

Over the past seven decades, the Tacoma Post has carried on this tradition of excellence in engineering support and remains an active forum for cooperation between military and civilian engineers in the Tacoma region and surrounding areas.

Original Objective from 1950:

In the interest of national defense; to advance knowledge of the science of military engineering; to promote efficiency in the military engineer service of the United States; to maintain its best standards and traditions, to preserve the memory services rendered by the engineering profession throughout the wars in which the United States has been engaged; to encourage and foster and develop between military engineers and other arms of the military service a spirit of cooperation and mutual understanding of their respective duties, powers and limitations; to encourage, foster and develop relations of helpful interest between the engineering profession in civil life and that in the military service; to hold meetings for the presentation and discussion of appropriate papers for social and professional intercourse.

SAME History

The Society of American Military Engineers grew from our nation's experiences in World War I, when more than 11,000 civilian engineers were called to duty as the United States entered the war. Upon their return, many feared the collective knowledge and the cooperation between the public and private sectors that proved vital to combat success would be lost. And, they suspected that what they had just experienced was not, in fact, "The War to End All Wars" Industry and military leaders determined to capitalize on the technical lessons and camaraderie shared during their battlefield experiences.

SAME was formed in 1919, as an "association of engineers" that would preserve and expand upon connections formed in war and promote the advancement of engineering and its related professions.

In the Puget Sound area there are Posts in Seattle and Tacoma. The two posts have formed a joint committee to address preparation for and response to emergencies and disasters. The committee was simply called "Readiness" for many years. In the last three years the name has changed twice, and it is now the "Emergency Preparedness and Homeland Security" committee. I am the Tacoma Post co-Chair of the committee.

Our work in support of emergency preparedness is to make known to Federal, State and Local emergency management officials and disaster relief organizations the capabilities of our Sustaining Members and to expedite their use during a disaster. These companies have engineering, architecture, construction, HAZMAT testing and mitigation, and numerous other capabilities. Our members have capabilities in 10 of the 15 Emergency Support Functions (ESF) in the National Response Framework.

There are 26 companies that have specifically volunteered their capabilities to be available in an emergency or disaster situation. Our committee has prepared this brochure with an explanation of the SAME role and a list of available firms.



Why join the Society of American Military Engineers?

If you are thinking of joining a professional association, it is critical that you ask yourself "what does membership provide for you?" We can all agree that there is little value in paying dues and investing time into an organization just to check a box. After all, the relationship you have with a professional association should create a connection to something that you can relate to and have a passion for. Everyone can benefit from what SAME has to offer, and you do not need to be an Engineer or have a degree to join. You can volunteer with your local Post, participate in networking events and professional development briefs, and even get a one-day pass for the annual Joint Engineer Training Conference (JETC) or Small Business Conference (SBC) at no cost.

SAME offers professional NCOs tangible value with real rewards, over three distinct periods in a career.

<u>Near-Term:</u> Active SAME membership thrusts us into an environment of exposure to engineering techniques and practices of industry and Military Departments other than our own. We soak up information and knowledge without realizing it, immediately making us better NCOs.

<u>Mid-Term:</u> SAME offers unique opportunities to continue our technical education and pursue licenses and certifications from affiliated associations. Over a few months, credentialing can better posture NCOs for increased responsibility and promotion. Taking advantage of these industry-recognized certifications will also assist with a smoother transition when exiting the military.

<u>Long-Term:</u> NCOs will one day move on from direct military service whether Active Duty or Reserve Component. Most of us change employers but we still prefer technical employment in such a rewarding field. If you want to secure the future, SAME offers the best opportunity for networking with potential employers.

I truly wish I had learned these things sooner in my career, so I urge you not to wait. Come see what SAME can do for you!
